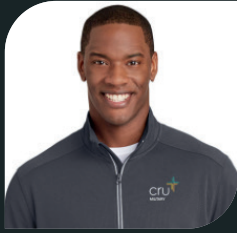
5 Ways to Stay Connected

EXPANDING OUR REACH LOCALLY

Prior to COVID, our San Diego team had very limited ministry to Drill Instructors. However, recently the Lord opened that door as only He can. Hear how He did this through the testimony of our MCRD San Diego Director, Glenn Westburg:

The Drill Instructors (DIs) have been on my heart ever since I started volunteering at Marine Corps Recruiting Depot, San Diego (MCRD SD). Since they work 112 hours every week there is no room to minister to them in any conventional fashion, so I was excited when, a few months ago, the depot chaplain asked me if I would help him and his wife remodel the DI lounge! After repainting, shampooing the carpet, hanging things on the walls, and providing 4 new recliners among other pieces of furniture, we transformed it into

a welcoming place for the DIs to rest and recoup on those rare occasions they have a few minutes to do so.

Among the improvements to the lounge were crates of bottled water, baskets of snacks, and a Keurig coffee machine. I was asked if I would consider keeping the lounge stocked with these supplies which I was glad to do. However, when putting my operational budget together this past year, the DI lounge was not on my radar, so I didn't anticipate the monthly cost of

providing this service to the DIs. So, after watching the budget decline over the last few months, I realized this ministry just isn't financially sustainable.

I began asking God to help me by providing me with options, either through local churches, small groups, or organizations who would help defray the monthly cost of this ministry.

On a recent trip to San Antonio to connect with ministry partners there about

the ministry at MCRD SD, a man pulled me aside and said, "If there's any special project you need help with, just let me know." I wasn't planning on asking for anything on this trip. My only goal in going to San Antonio was to thank my supporters face to face, but since he asked, I brought up the DI lounge and my desire to find help in defraying the monthly cost. Upon his request, I shared the monthly financial need. He glanced at his wife and said, 'we'd like to be the first to donate a month's supply.' Needless to say, I thanked them and was inwardly very grateful to God for this unexpected gift.

The next morning after church this man called my cell to tell me he wanted me to bring 'something back to San Diego' and proceeded to inform me that after talking with his wife, he would like to cover the first 12 months of the cost to stock the DI lounge!

WORKING WITH CHAPLAINS

And if that wasn't enough, he proceeded to tell me since talking with me the night before, he'd already been working on family and friends who he seemed confident would cover the following 12 months!

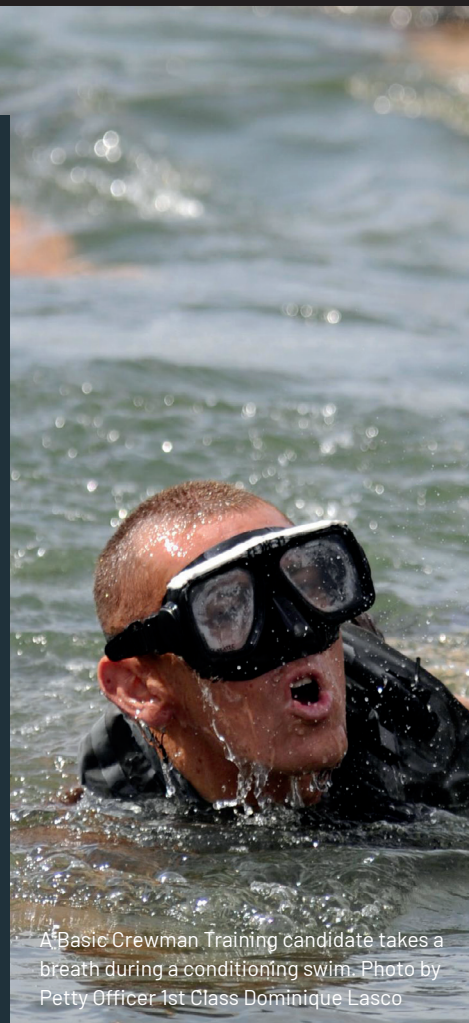

After having most of our Basic Training ministry efforts paused due to COVID, we are finally beginning to see doors reopening across the nation. To God be the glory! Our Marine Corps boot camp ministries in Parris Island and San Diego are back in full swing. Army ministry is flourishing at Ft Benning, Ft Sill, and Ft Leonard Wood, with Ft Jackson poised for a restart at the first of the new year. While we continue to pray for the Air Force basic training ministry to reopen at Lackland, we praise God for reopening the door recently at Navy basic training in Great Lakes: In the four Sundays in December, 180 recruits in our Alpha class heard the gospel, with four making decisions to follow Christ. In addition, 37 Recruits returned to our Bravo classes to study about what it means to be a disciple.

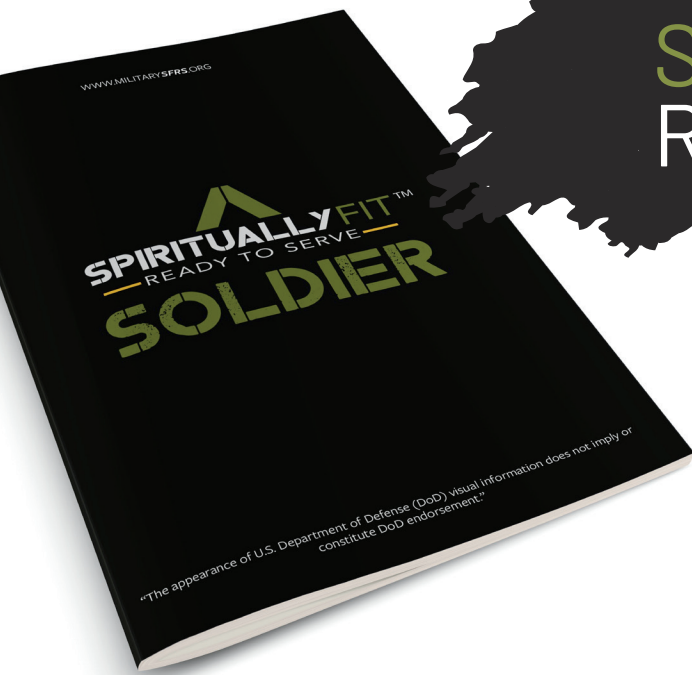

During a trip to Ft Campbell, we contacted Kyle and invited him to lunch. We learned that he had attended the Spiritual Fitness classes held for trainees during his time in Basic Training at Ft Benning, GA, five years earlier. Kyle shared "I still have my little (Spiritual Fitness Guide) book and notebook. I refer to them often to remind myself of who I am in Christ." He went on to say that he wants to use Cru Military materials to hold a Bible study to share that same message of hope to the soldiers in his unit.

We encouraged Kyle to connect with his unit's chaplain and tell him what he wanted to do. The chaplain was excited to have a young soldier eager to lead a Bible study and published the plan throughout the Brigade. Kyle also attends a local church whose lead pastor is an Army veteran himself and gives Kyle their full support. This is a great example of the gospel partnerships we seek to create between Cru Military, the local church, and the Chaplain Corps. We're all on the same team and can work together to WIN, BUILD, and SEND Christ-centered multiplying disciples who launch spiritual movements in the global military community.

Steve and Karen Dorner are Cru Military's Ministry Team Leaders of the San Antonio, Texas, combat trauma, REBOOT, and post-traumatic stress (PTS) ministries. In 2021, they saw God move in the hearts and lives of those seeking healing from combat trauma. After leading a Virtual REBOOT Advance class as a follow-up discipleship course for REBOOT graduates, they experienced both REBOOT team members and REBOOT graduates stepping up to serve others. As a result, the local in-person ministry as well as their virtual outreach expanded.

After attending Steve and Karen's Spring 2021 REBOOT and REBOOT ADVANCE courses, five couples felt called to host or lead REBOOT in their local communities or a virtual setting. Two individuals were

inspired to launch a small group in their local area using Cru Military resources. The Dorners worked with training, coaching, and assisting these leaders in planning the initiatives. During the summer of 2021, three of the Dorners' REBOOT team members, Matt Soileau and Jack and Yolanda Fliss, expanded their trauma care footprint in San Antonio, by leading REBOOT Combat Recovery and REBOOT First Responders groups in partnership with Cru Military and a local church. While these groups are not directly sponsored by Cru Military, Matt and Jack have been trained by Cru Military. On September 16th, Matt and Jack launched a new rotation of REBOOT Combat Recovery, hosted by Fellowship of San Antonio Church, who provided meeting space, dinner, and childcare.

On June 16, the Dorners launched a 5-week virtual training course for those with a heart to serve veterans affected by trauma. This course is called Overcome Academy and is a REBOOT course that helps participants overcome barriers to serving others and equips the extended REBOOT graduate community in responding to others who have also experienced trauma. The Dorners' June-July Overcome Academy class had members from seven states, many of whom were Steve and Karen's own REBOOT graduates. Out of the course participants, REBOOT

grads Jenny & Luke Thurmond joined the Dorners' local ministry team as REBOOT volunteers in San Antonio and served at their Fall Virtual REBOOT. One began volunteering with the Cru Military Ministry Support Team, and individuals from other states began working toward launching REBOOT in their own local churches and communities, with support of Cru Military.

On November 29, Steve and Karen again graduated nine participants from their 12-week Virtual REBOOT Combat Recovery course. The course began on September 12 with seven team members including the Dorners, two of whom are REBOOT

graduates themselves from a previous course led by the Dorners. The graduates of the fall 2021 course include seven current-era veterans and two spouses. As the course was virtual, it opened the door to allow military members and their families to participate from all over the U.S., including Washington, D.C., Texas, Tennessee, North Carolina, Iowa, and Connecticut.

It is amazing to witness the transformations and close ties made in just 12 weeks of a virtual class. Karen and Steve are continuing the fellowship with these graduates through another REBOOT Advance course beginning in 2022.





FROM AROUND THE MINISTRY

LATIN AMERICA

In-person ministry throughout Latin America has been a difficult obstacle to navigate around these past months. We proclaim God's abundant favor in what we readily acknowledge as His divine favor of "increase upon increase." There are over 500 Latin American cadets engaged in weekly discipleship studies in Honduras, Panama, Guatemala, and the Dominican Republic. God's favor has extended to the over 80 Christian generals, admirals, officers, chaplains, and volunteers from 12 nations regularly praying God's blessing on their nations' military members.

We also declare God's goodness in the power of one. It only took one committed volunteer, surrendered to the Spirit, to inspire 14 additional volunteers to begin the foundational work of Cru Military Colombia in 2021. Finally, we declare the Lord's favor upon the plans our entire Latin American team is prayerfully bringing before the Lord that they might receive guidance on continuing this work among our Latin American leaders in the coming 12 months!

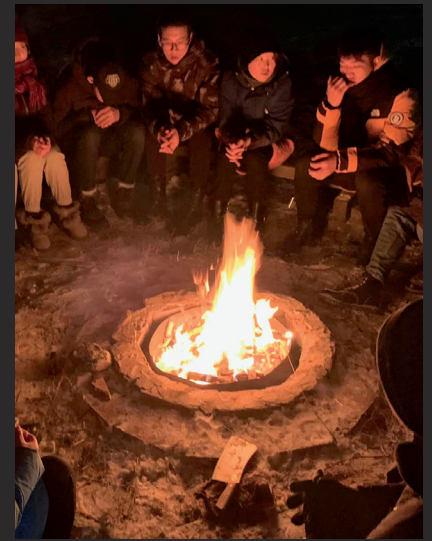
ASIA

In Mongolia, God continues to move in powerful ways to advance the knowledge of Christ among the military and uniformed servicemen and women there. The addition of essential volunteers in the northern and southern parts of this nation has mobilized concerted prayers and the inclusion of local leaders who have fully embraced our WIN-BUILD-SEND hearts! Despite “on again and off again”

COVID restrictions, Centurion Ministry (Military Ministry in Mongolia) has shown impressive perseverance to which we can only give praise and thanksgiving unto the Lord. Our “Cadet Leadership Seminar” in October saw over 120 cadets attend this virtual gathering. From this outreach, over 80 cadets responded to learn more about the ministry, while 20 of those attending the optional in-person meeting accepted Christ as their Savior the following day.

MAX (UKRAINE) – ROMAN PIKULIK

A couple months ago Max decided to leave the university and enlist in the Army because he had lost a close friend in the war. Max is a Christian and his home church objected and condemned his decision to join the army. His friend (a close acquaintance of mine) gave me his contact details so I could support and encourage him. I talked with Max on the phone and we communicated through text messages. Finally in November we met in person after I contacted his chaplain and was allowed to visit him at the training ground. I was able to share my personal testimony and the gospel with Max's fellow servicemen. Now Max is doing well and takes the initiative to share his faith in Christ with other Ukrainian soldiers. Our ministry is trying to help him be more effective. Max may soon be sent to a combat zone. Pray, for the preservation of his life and the courage to share the gospel with those around him.

AFRICA

This year we hosted our second African Leadership Summit in September when we brought together CCCI Regional and Africa National Team Leaders, Military Ministry Directors, volunteers, and brothers and sisters from other like-minded ministry organizations. Our own Eddy Amponsah (Area Operations AOA, Military Ministry Global) moderated scores of attendees from several nations for a beautiful time of prayer, encouragement, and training. While combat operations in the country of Chad have decreased for the moment, our ministry's efforts included discipleship training preparing soldiers to minister to their peers, greatly extending our Director's reach and impact throughout the military.

A very impressive evangelistic outreach held in a Cameroon training center witnessed almost hundreds of non-commissioned officers and about 200 NCOs receiving Christ. The success of this new outreach opened the doors for significant penetration among emerging leaders in the coming years. Our hope and prayers are focused on encouraging our leaders on the ground in the coming months. We believe God's favor will go before us as he opens the doors of effective ministry! Finally, the ministry in Nigeria has been engaged in Women's Discipleship through in-person gatherings through small group sessions for uniformed women and those married to the ones who wear the uniform.

EUROPE

Despite wrestling with numerous COVID restrictions and access issues, our team members refocused their efforts on maximizing every in-person ministry opportunity the Lord made possible. They are still connecting with cadets in Romania and seeking out Ukrainian veterans as this nation

recently celebrated its independence during their “Undeclared” patriotic festival. (Their 4th of July and Veterans Day combined!) One-on-one life-changing opportunities were the focus of our work throughout Europe last year. With the recent CCCI global reorganization, we hope the stage is set for even greater depth and scope of outreach in the months He has already prepared for us.

used veterans’ holidays and a retreat for veterans to make face-to-face divine connections. They planned a Christmas outreach in December, along with a retreat in the western Ukraine region. These activities could be timely events, as Ukraine has been on high alert with the recent build-up of Russian troops along their border. In Romania, God allowed our Military Ministry Director, Vali, to continue discipleship of first-year cadets in the military academy with every first-year cadet having the opportunity to join their Bible study! Many other beautiful opportunities are opening up for the spring of 2022 in academies in three countries. Pray that God uses this to build a spiritual future for officers at the beginning of their military careers.

God is moving in Europe as He uses the local, national staff to reach the military. Roma and their team began the spring with online talks on suicide for active military and veterans. Thousands of Ukrainians watched the video, showing the team how serious this subject was, creating excellent visibility, and connecting many contacts. The team

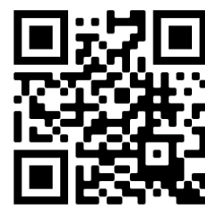

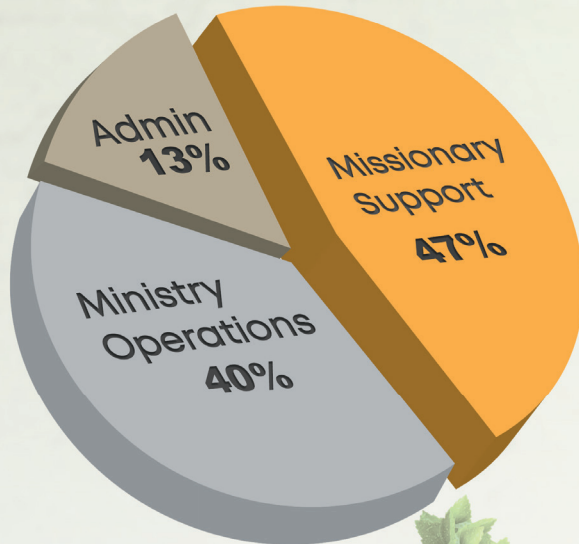

Nearly 90% of our annual budget directly supports our ministry operations and missionary teams. The remaining 13% is used for administration and corporate overhead.

For Military Ministry of Cru (Cru Military) calendar year 2021 was a year of moving forward. While our nation and many other world leaders reacted to pandemic and political fears, God was faithful in positioning Cru Military for the future, by reopening many doors to ministry, and even opening a few new ones! We continue to build on new ministry opportunities we established with Drill Instructors, military spouses, and expansions at several current locations.

In our fund development efforts, we are faithfully moving forward with the Retain/Regain/Recruit approach with ministry partners. Travel restrictions began to relax, making our partner and relationship building efforts more effective with in-person visits. God brought increased year-end funding, giving us margin for the ministry expansion that He is positioning us to provide!

We believe 2022 will begin our three-year plan of “ministry advancement.” Cru Military’s average weekly ministry connections increased by well over 100% from 2020 to 2021! God began providing new

volunteers to help meet this future expansion and growth. With our full ministry advancement team onboard, our reach and connection with financial partners saw a significant increase and impact. We are a remote team located in four different states, and we know any successful ministry advancement team is built upon positive relationships—with each other and with financial partners. Understanding this truth, we have a virtual prayer and praise time together each week which continues to be foundational to our team cohesion and capacity.

Our funding challenge continues, and these blessings from God are but stairsteps to the global ministry God has for Cru Military. As you can see from the graphic our 2022 Budget Goal is \$5.5 million. Nearly 90% of our annual budget directly supports our global missionary staff, who daily take the gospel of Jesus Christ to the military community ... winning them to Jesus Christ, building them in their faith, to send them as multiplying disciples for Christ.

As you read the stories and measures of success throughout this report, you can see 2021 proved to be our year of moving forward, and 2022 begins our three-year-plan of ministry advancement! Please pray every day for our staff, financial partners, but mostly the global military community we serve... many who are in harm’s way, every day.

If there was one verse that could accurately describe Cru Military's new Interim Executive Directors, Daryl and Martha Jones, it would be Colossians 3:17, "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him." On any given day, you'll find Daryl and Martha active and

diligent in their work, but joyfully engaged in this ministry to which God has called them. The Joneses know their call into ministry leadership squarely rests upon divine and sovereign grace.

Their lives and marriage totally changed after committing themselves to Christ while attending chapel services at Minot Air Force Base, North Dakota. Afterward, they felt the Lord calling them as missionaries while still on active-duty, and God's hands have directed and sustained them into many ministry opportunities where they can give back, fully aware of all the Lord has given them! They understand that it is the Lord who has allowed and blessed them to be part of Cru Military, with its global and eternal impact for Christ among their "military people group," whom they have devoted their lives to serving for over 20 years.
